L: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. **C: And also with you.**

+Call to Worship

L: In God's house, we can be joyful.

C: We can be grateful. We can be hopeful.

L: In God's house, we can be weary.

C: We can be anxious. We can be grieving.

L: In God's house, we can be honest—

C: inspired or tired, delighted or doubtful, connected or curious, and everything in between.

L: This is God's house. You are welcome exactly as you are.

C: Let us worship our loving God.

+Call to Confession & Assurance of Forgiveness

L: Friends in Christ, we meet at the waters of Baptism, where the Gospel of Luke tells us that the sky opened and the voice of God was heard saying "You are my beloved, with whom I am well pleased."

With that same joy and passion God has claimed each of us in the forgiving waters of Baptism. So trusting that Good News we share everything with our loving God who is eager to comfort us in our struggles and ease our burdens:

L: Loving God,

C: From the very beginning, you breathed life into us and called us good. However, somewhere along the way we replaced "good" with "not enough." Somewhere along the way we turned the volume up on that phrase and began to doubt our own self-worth. Forgive us, for this is not what you have taught us. When the world tells us we are not enough, you call us beloved. Show us how to return to that truth. Show us how to let go of our weariness and rest in Your good news. Amen.

L: Family of faith, God's grace and understanding is deeper and wider than we can possibly imagine. Speak these words of grace that you might experience them in your heart:

C: Our story begins with belovedness. Even when we lose our way, even if we stumble and fall, God never stops breaking through the lies to claim us.

We are known. We are forgiven. We are beloved. Thanks be to God! Amen.

+Prayer of the Day

L: Beloved God,

C: in our baptism you claim us as your children and tell us we are beloved. Help us to break through the weariness of our lives to know that truth is more powerful than any burden we carry, object that hinders, or false narrative we believe. We claim the power of your love in the grace of Jesus, our Saviour. Amen.

First Reading: Acts 19:1-7


While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the interior regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. ² He said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?" They replied, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." ³ Then he said, "Into what, then, were you baptized?" They answered, "Into John's baptism." ⁴ Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus." ⁵ On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. ⁶ When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied, ⁷ altogether there were about twelve of them.

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵ And the whole Judean region and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him and were baptized by him in the River Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶ Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷ He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the strap of his sandals. ⁸ I have baptized you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

⁹ In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰ And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove upon him. ¹¹ And a voice came from the heavens, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."



C: Amen.




