

Accessible to All



When we celebrate Holy Communion at House of Prayer, you'll hear an invitation that reminds us that ALL are welcome at Christ's table. The shape of *all* sometimes emphasizes that children are welcome, other times guests,

Pastor Eric Luedtke other times those who aren't members of HOP. No matter what, it is theologically important that ALL people are able to share in this meal.

Recently we were asked by a guest if we have a specific "gluten free chalice" as part of our communion practice of intinction. At the time, we did not, which meant we needed to make a change to our practice. For those that don't know, gluten (commonly contained in wheat) can be shed from one item to another. The act of dipping a wheat wafer into a chalice then means there are tiny bits of gluten in the chalice. For someone who is gluten intolerant or allergic, this presents an issue.

To solve this, we now offer our gluten free wafers with a separate gluten free chalice in both services. You may notice the gluten free plate set on the west side of the altar in the sanctuary and that after the words of institution the Pastor will move the presentation chalice to this side of the altar as well. This is a specific gluten free communion pairing for those who need it. If you're among that crowd, simply ask the server for gluten free and the server will set down their communion plate, pick-up the gluten free set, and present it to you. You will be invited to take your own wafer and dip it into the chalice, hearing as always the words "body of Christ, given for you" and "blood of Christ, shed for you."

Yes, this process will take a little extra time, but this is how we practice Christ's hospitality in making sure that ALL are welcome at Christ's table. This is how we live out our core value of *Welcoming* and being a *Compassionate Community*. It's how we live into our mission of *being inwardly fed* to outwardly feed and caring for each other. It's how we live into our vision of encountering Christ in each other (or maybe how others encounter Christ in us).

How else might we increase accessibility at House of Prayer? What barriers exist that prevent people from being able to participate in worship or activities of our congregation? Share your thoughts and ideas with LMT members, staff, and Pastor Eric so that we can work together to breakdown the barriers that prevent people from joining us regularly.

Compassionate Community

Continuing with our theme of values, next up is Compassionate Community. Here is what our values say about compassionate community: "We are committed to walk with all those who suffer or struggle. We extend our compassion and love within our congregation, our community and world. We strive to meet the felt needs of the hurting and to work for solutions that address underlying causes of injustice." As with all of our values, one of the most crucial parts is how we broadcast our compassion into the wider community. It's easy to care about each other in the congregation, and we're great at it! The harder part is to extend that love out into the world that isn't always so lovely back. But that's exactly why we continue to share and spread our love, to show the world that love and compassion is still all around us.

We are great at taking care of each other, it's one of the things I (and I'm sure many of you) love most about House of Prayer. Our community is so important, I've met some of my best friends here. There are so many lifelong relationships that I treasure that have begun at HOP. Each week at handbells I can't wait to check in with my bell buddies and see how they're doing. We hear the list of those in our community that need our prayers each week and we keep them in our hearts and minds.

In addition to how great we are at taking care of each other, we also do a pretty great job in the wider community. Lutherans love food and it shows! Between Simpson Shelter, Veggie Table, Every Meal, VEAP, Feed My Children, Loaves and Fishes, Meals on Wheels, the list goes on and on! And those are just the things we are doing in the community to do with food.

The outreach that is done here is so valuable in the short-term as well as the longterm. The things that we do to combat issues that face our community may seem like a given to the people within our walls, but it's important to note that how we treat any situation may have positive ramifications in the future. I see that on display perfectly in the communities and groups that we rent our beautiful space out to every week. If

the people within House of Prayer were standoffish, unwelcoming, or compassionless, something tells me we wouldn't have as many visitors and different groups as we do. And that's a wonderful thing! It shows that people that aren't regular or long-time members value how we run our ship (or ark) enough that they want to become either staples of our congregation or bring their own group in to share in the features of the church that make it so terrific.

There is certainly a case to be made that showing compassion and care is as important externally as it is internally. But there's no doubt that the lives of people inside of HOP are a special kind of intertwined. I see it in the fact that conversation is always flowing on Sundays, whether people are stopping someone to ask how they're doing, how their latest vacation was or how their pets are holding up. The fact that so many people care so deeply about the details of each other's lives is something not to take for granted. With that grouping and conversation comes a natural desire to continue the connection on the ride to and from church, and the amount of carpooling, picking up, and after church outings that occur cannot be ignored either.

A display of how people care for one another is shown in the bad times, not just the good. If we have a sick member of the congregation, it's an "all-hands-on-deck" effort to make sure they're cared for. If we have someone come to church that hasn't been in weeks or months, there's no sense of judgment, and no discerning eyes sent from pew to pew. Instead, there is always a warm greeting, a handshake or yes, even a light-hearted comment about where they've been. The compassion shown in hard times makes it that much more meaningful, and I think we at HOP do a wonderful job of that.

Leadership Ministry Team Update

Monthly Finance Report

December continues a string of good months, with a net operating revenue of \$15,771 compared to a budget of \$7,029. Fiscal year-to-date operating net revenue was higher than budget by \$1,115 compared to a budget of net operating deficit of \$53,965.

Compared to prior year, total revenue is trending similarly, and expenses are slightly higher. Additional dedicated funds received and dedicated funds used contributed to a total net revenue of \$1,305 for fiscal year to date.



REVENUE

December offerings came in lower than expected, down \$11,000 from last year, and \$5,066 lower than budget, but January is off to a good start. Fiscal year to date, the total mix of revenue from offering, rent, and preschool tuition is on budget. Additional rent dates booked by our contract renters, and the continued rent contract with Southview will show strong revenue vs budget in the coming winter and spring months. Our budget assumptions excluded Southview rent from Jan - June. The church has not received a "notice to vacate" from Southview, which is encouraging.

EXPENSES

Expenses through the second quarter are lower than budget by \$51,943, with savings in utilities, property and human resources categories. A warmer winter with less snow has led to lower heating and plow costs, along with fewer routine HVAC repairs. human resource savings are due to the open ministry position expense.

DEDICATED FUND ACTIVITY

Dedicated funds activity in December included a transfer-in of the Jon Kietzer Music Ministry funds previously maintained by the HOP Foundation, for the church to use for such purpose directly. Dedicated funds were also used for nursery carpet replacement including an unexpected asbestos abatement, paid for from preschool (grant funds received) and facilities funds.


LMT Meeting






