Welcoming



Monthly Finance Report

September and first quarter financial performance continues to trend better than budget. HOP had a net operating deficit of \$6,964 for September vs. a budgeted deficit of \$8,875. First quarter showed a similar performance with a net operating deficit of \$14,841 vs. a budgeted deficit of \$43,005. The dedicated fund activity, which created a net positive revenue helped bring the total net deficit for September to about break even at \$328, and for the first quarter, a \$9,428 deficit. Monthly Finance Report Cont'd

REVENUE

Offerings drive much of the revenue variance, and it is encouraging to see a 3-month trend in giving that is now 4% better than budget. Revenue also compares favorably to prior year, up 4% for the first quarter, due primarily to higher rent revenue and a small increase in offerings.

EXPENSES

September and first quarter expenses came in lower than budget. Savings were in areas of HR with open staff positions of ministry staff, and in utilities, with tapering energy costs and lower HVAC repairs

DEDICATED ACTIVITY

Grants were the word of the month for September. Both the HOP Foundation and First Childrens Finance provided funding for expenses including refuel technology, friendship fund gas cards for the community, and preschool revitalization projects.

CASH

Cash balances include \$473,000 in the bank at the end of September, of which \$211,000 is operating reserves, \$200,000 restricted dedicated funds, and \$48,000unrestricted funds.

Note: At the end of each quarter, I will provide a break down on major expense costs and variance from budget. On a month- to-month basis, variances can be due to timing rather than increases or decreases to expense. Quarterly should show trends in expenses better.

Minister of Congregational Care (MCC) Position Posted



During the Transition Team work before calling Pastor Eric and during the Cottage Meetings held last Spring, there was a consistent need lifted up for a staff position to support visitation and networks of care at House of Prayer. At our June congregational meeting, the budget was approved with a budget line for a Minister for Congregational Care. The job description has been created and posted on the Announcements page of the HOP website (and we are working with our Minneapolis Area Synod to develop a pool of candidates to interview for the position.

This is a part-time position with primary responsibilities focused on visitation of homebound and hospitalized members. The ideal candidate will be able to build networks of care within the congregation and help our members look outward with their compassionate care toward others. We anticipate this candidate will be involved in the worship life of House of Prayer including preaching and leading worship about once a month. If you are aware of someone who might be interested in the position, please invite them to apply for the position or share their information with Pastor Eric so we can include them in the pool of candidates. 
Book Discussion Group


House of Prayer Book Discussion Group will meet on Thursday, November 2, at 1:30 pm in the Office Conference Room.

Building Maintenance Update

Summer and Fall provided great opportunities for building maintenance around HOP. After our 2023 -24 budget was approved at the June Annual Congregational Meeting and we received confirmation of grant funds awarded to HOP Preschool, we've moved ahead on these maintenance projects.

- New Carpet for the Nursery Approved \$6,400. Old roll carpet in the Nursery and Sleeping Room will be torn up and replaced with colorful carpet squares. Targeting Thanksgiving week for install when Preschool is closed.
- Quote Process for Vinyl Planking in Education Hall & Classrooms Bid \$41,000. Received one bid for LVP to cover asbestos tile in Education Hallway & Classrooms. Tiles are currently secure enough to allow installation over existing material. Doing this project soon will save abatement cost. This is not a 2023-24 budgeted expense. We will get several other bids before moving forward and determine if we can use dedicated funds to proceed.
- Parking Lot Repair Approved, Phase 1 complete \$5,000. Removed cracked asphalt and filled in low area in parking lot to prevent winter ice build-up and improve safety. Phase 2 to seal coat and stripe lot will be done in the Spring (Approx \$17,000).
- Digital Controls for Boiler Approved \$13,000. Work will start in November to install digital controls for the boiler and the pumps to replace old pneumatic controls that no longer function. Heating will be easier to control in the offices / sanctuary and will adjust based on outside air temperatures. This will smooth temperatures inside and hopefully save money.
